NEEDS ASSESSMENT

This course is designed to change physician competence performance in practice and was developed for the primary care clinician, allied health personnel, ophthalmic technicians, and school nurses involved in the day-to-day care of children.

The examination of a child's eye varies greatly from that of an adult. The eyes of a child are dynamic and growing. The examination must be tailored to the developmental level of the child. This half-day course will provide examination techniques to increase accuracy in the pediatric eye examination. It will identify vision problems in children and how to accurately screen for them. Common eye problems such as red eye and strabismus will be addressed. In addition, an interactive panel of pediatric eye doctors will discuss common clinical scenarios with input from the audience.

As a result of course participant evaluations and community physician annual needs assessment surveys, the need for cutting edge information about pediatric ophthalmology has been identified. This conference will specifically address the identified educational needs and provide practitioners with state-of-the art tools to provide improved treatment options for their patients. Faculty presenting and interacting with participants at this activity have been selected on the basis of their comprehensive clinical experience and academic excellence.

ACCREDITATION



The University of California, Davis Health System is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (ACCME) to provide continuing medical education for physicians.

Physician Assistant: The National Commission on Certification of Physician Assistants (NCCPA) states that *AMA PRA Category 1 Credits™* are acceptable for continuing medical education requirements for recertification.

Tuition is \$125 for physicians, \$75 for other healthcare professionals and \$50 for ophthalmic technicians. **Confirmation of registration will be sent within two weeks after receipt of enrollment form.** The fees will increase after February 16, 2012.

Reduced tuition is available for School Nurses or Nursing Students. School principals and program directors may submit the completed enrollment form with a cover letter requesting tuition discount. Letters must be received by March 1, 2012.

Tuition includes a continental breakfast, refreshment break, and an electronic syllabus. Tuition may be paid by check, American Express, Discover, MasterCard or VISA. Cash is not accepted. Program materials cannot be guaranteed unless enrollment is received by March 16th. The Office of Continuing Medical Education reserves the right to cancel this program. In such a case, a full refund will be given.

Registration forms received without payments will not be processed until payment is received, and payment must follow within 10 days. Early discount rates are honored if payment is received by the date noted on the enrollment form. After that date, the late fee is applied.

- Identify the different methods of correcting refractive disorders
- Identify how to diagnose amblyopia in a child
- Perform an accurate cover test to screen for strabismus
- Differentiate an infectious from non-infectious red eye
- Differentiate emergent from non-emergent pediatric eye problems

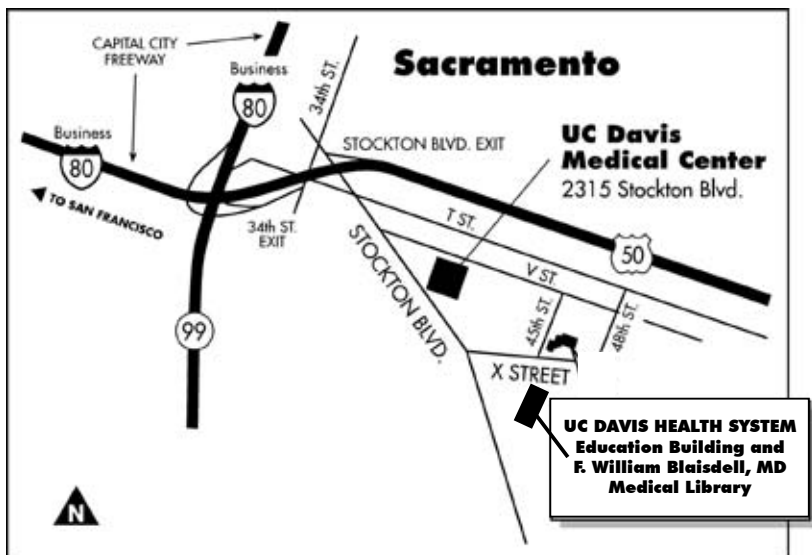

It is the intent of the bill, which went into effect on July 1, 2006, to encourage physicians and surgeons, CME providers in the state of California, and the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education to meet the cultural and linguistic concerns of a diverse patient population through appropriate professional development.
